

ABOUT THE CONVENING

Now as much as ever, radical gathering spaces for rumination on Black freedoms are crucial. From February 23 - 27, 2021, Black Spatial Relics (BSR) is hosting its second annual convening. Building on our work to create Black spaces for creation, exploration, and community, this will be a free and virtual convening that will feature our 2020 artists-in-residence and several other Black performance makers and scholars from around Philadelphia and beyond. Featuring keynotes from **Ebony Noelle Golden** and **Germaine Ingram**, original work by **Viktor L. Ewing-Givens**, workshops and an artist talk from **Misty Sol** (Philadelphia, PA), **Danielle Deadwyler** (Atlanta, GA), **Ada Pinkston** (Baltimore, MD), and **Crystal Z Campbell** (Tulsa, OK), a BSR commissioned Philly Black Carribean Zine curated by **Shanel Edwards**, and a Black Diaspora Artist Salon hosted by **Jumatatu Poe**, this digital convening is celebrating and learning from the centuries-long Black freedom dialectic between the Caribbean and Philadelphia, as we launch new spaces in our residency program for artists in the Caribbean. This convening is presented in partnership with **Center for Experimental Ethnography at Penn** and **Howlround**. Registration will open Tuesday February 16th at blackspatialrelics.org. The convening will be free and open to the public.

FIVE YEARS AND THE FUTURE: DREAM WITH US

At this year's annual convening we celebrate five years of Black Spatial Relics. Founded in 2016 at the Center for the Study of Slavery and Justice at Brown University, the Black Spatial Relics (BSR) Residency initially supported the development of two new performance works that addressed and incorporated the public history of slavery and contemporary issues of justice. Over these past five years we have built a wide web of Black creatives across the United States..

Since 2016, BSR has supported:

- ◆ 8 Artists-in-Residence (offered supportina 2,500.00 award, dramaturgical support and presenting opportunities)
- ◆ 12 Microgrants (Microgrants were initiated in 2020 in response to the pandemic to support Black collective research and community care efforts.)
- ◆ 2 Convenings (Presenting a suite of Black radical performance makers from around the U.S.)

We look forward to expanding our reach further, and creating more opportunities for Black creatives to come together, dream, and create. In 2021 will be celebrating and learning from the centuries-long Black freedom dialectic between the Caribbean and Philadelphia, as we launch new spaces in our residency program for artists in the Caribbean.

Sharing in love, joy, hope, and freedom dreaming, together we will celebrate how far Black Spatial Relics has come in 2021, and look forward to what is in the stars next. We invite you to look back on all of our proudest moments as an initiative, and join us in our future growth.

ABOUT BLACK SPATIAL RELICS

Black Spatial Relics is a new performance residency about slavery, justice, and freedom. The residency annually supports the development of new performance works that address and incorporate public histories of slavery and contemporary issues and pursuits of justice and freedom. Founded in 2016,, Black Spatial Relics is now in its fifth year of programming as a residency program, convener and regrantor.
